Dear _____,

The North Olympic Salmon Coalition and Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe are teaming up to remove invasive noxious weeds along the Dungeness River. **We are offering free removal of riverside weeds to landowners living along the Dungeness River.**

Invasive noxious weeds found along the Dungeness River include butterfly bush, blackberries, Scotch broom, knotweed, and poison hemlock. These weeds are pests and are tough to get out and keep out. We'd like to help.

At your invitation, we'll come out and look at your land with you. Together, we'll come up with a weed management plan that can include scheduling our crew to remove creekside weeds for you. **The crew is available for two weeks in July and August and one week in October.**

Getting rid of these weeds is the first and most important step toward enhancing habitat for fish and wildlife, improving water quality and increasing the number of wild salmon. Weed removal will allow you to enjoy the river even more.
